

FROM OUR PASTOR

I write this article for the 4th of July weekend—Independence Day—and the weekend we convene for common worship. It feels good to have a congregation again. I have felt lost when we haven't gathered. There has been much preparation for this weekend, including the training of hospitality ministers and eucharistic ministers according to protocol set forth from the directives of both the governor and Bishop Kettler. I thank our volunteers.

What we are doing is certainly not perfect, but we are *moving forward*. We have protocols set that will help us to do some things that are necessary and “normal” for us as Catholics—worship together. Our procedures will work whether the numbers allowed for gathering are 500, 250, 50 or 10. I thank our Task Force for Reconvening for their work. We are a large parish. We also have a unique position of being a resort area. We also welcome our guests and visitors. Careful planning for the safety of others is paramount.

As we have gathered, things seem kind of strange at first. We have asked people to mask up for the protection of those who are most vulnerable who will join us. Parents, you know your children. If a mask will cause more distraction for your little ones, then don't try to mask them up. You will be seated as a family. Regarding dividing up and assigning Masses by alphabet: We are not going to be rejecting anyone who comes to a time slot designated for a different last name. We are using the alphabet to level out any spikes in attendance so that we allow everyone a chance to attend Mass a couple times during July and allow for the unknown of our summer visitors. Each alphabetical division is about 70% of that section of the alphabet, about 325-350 households. When we see how many come from each alphabetical section (plus the summer visitors), we will have an idea of how many Masses we need and will adjust accordingly. We will get to a point, hopefully quickly, where anyone can come to any Mass. It is easier to ADD Masses than to take away. At the same time, we are adding First Communion Masses in August among other events, just trying to catch up. I am one person. That being said, if we add a Mass, we need more hospitality ministers. I suspect we will add at least one more Mass on a Saturday late afternoon. We also need Hospitality and Eucharistic Ministry volunteers for weddings, funerals, the First Communion Masses on August 9 and 16 at 2:00 PM, and Holy Days. We know that we are doing things differently from other parishes. Most parishes are much smaller. With a large community there is more planning. But planning is *not* an end in itself, it is a *means to THIS end---to help us to gather for worship in a way that is the safest we can be for the most vulnerable among us*. That is our goal. We are one Body in Christ—young and old together. We are called to care for each other.

Do I wish the virus never happened? Of course I do! I so wish we could be *the way we were*. But that is not to be in the near future; if in fact, maybe ever again. I mourn the loss of what was. It is really grief—which includes denial, anger and even depression. That is certainly true for me. The pastoral duties that I so love and give me energy cannot be done in the manner I had done them. Certainly, celebrating Mass with all of you and with all of us singing together—that has changed. Visiting a home to celebrate the Sacrament of the Sick I have to mask and think of procedures to keep the family and myself safe. It seems that everyone is a suspected carrier. I hate that feeling. Working on safety protocols and procedures was an energy drainer for me, but we had to do it so we can meet again. It all seems like a bunch of rules. But in reality, they will allow us to gather. So....we embark today. Please be patient as we are trying to adapt as we need to.



JULY IS ULTRAVIOLET (UV) SAFETY MONTH

Most skin cancers are caused by too much exposure to ultraviolet (UV) rays. Most UV exposure comes from the sun, but indoor tanning beds and sun lamps also are a source of UV rays. There are two main types of UV rays: UVA and UVB. UVB rays have more energy and are a more potent cause of at least some skin cancers, but both UVA and UVB rays can damage and cause skin cancer. The American Cancer Society simply states, "there are no safe UV rays."

The strength of the sun's UV rays reaching the ground depends on a number of factors, such as:

1. Time of the day: UV rays are strongest in the middle of the day, between 10:00 AM and 4:00 PM.
2. Season of the Year: UV rays are stronger during the spring and summer months.
3. Altitude: More UV rays reach the ground at higher elevations.
4. Cloud Cover: The effect of clouds can vary, but it is important to note that UV rays can get through to the ground, even on a cloudy day.
5. Reflection off Surfaces: UV rays can bounce off surfaces like water, sand, snow and pavement.
6. Length of Time: Along with the strength of the rays, the amount of UV exposure also depends on the length of time your skin is exposed, and if it is protected by clothing and sunscreen.

The use of sunscreen is an important method to protect your skin from UV rays. Sunscreen is just a filter; it does not block all UV rays. Sunscreen should be thought of as your first line of defense. Your skin cancer protection plan should include sunscreen as well as staying in the shade and wearing protective clothing. When choosing a sunscreen be sure to choose one with broad spectrum protection, meaning against both UVA and UVB rays, and with sun protection factor (SPF) values of 30 or higher. Sun Protection Factor (SPF) number is the level of protection the sunscreen provides against UVB rays, the main cause of sunburn. For example, when applying an SPF 30 sunscreen correctly, you get the equivalent of 1 minute of UVB rays for each 30 minutes you spend in the sun. A sunscreen of SPF 30 filters out about 97% of UVB rays. The higher you go in SPF the smaller the differences become. No sunscreen protects you completely.

As we settle into our days in the sun with much anticipation, please remember the sunscreen too!

UV SAFETY MONTH

Stewardship

Ted Knutson grew up on a farm in a rich agricultural community. When he married, he operated a farm a few miles from his father's farm. A short distance away was a rural church where he worshipped regularly with his family.

Knutson was a sincere Christian who had served on various boards in his congregation. He had always gone to this rural church and was unfamiliar with the stewardship programs in other churches. In his congregation the support came from the "membership dues." When the crops had been harvested and sold, these "dues" were collected. The church finance committee would then retire their obligations hoping there would be enough left in the bank to keep up expenses until the next fall. If they ran short during the year they would borrow from the bank, or else visit the members to collect the amount they were short.

Mr. Knutson was confused and perplexed when he listened to a visiting speaker at the men's group in his church. The subject was stewardship. The speaker said that in many town and country churches, the standard of giving was abnormally low. He also said that Christian people ought to make weekly pledges in support of the Lord's work in their parish and throughout the world. He stressed emphatically that pledges should be based on a proportion of one's income, and that they should be given regularly.

As he listened to the speaker many thoughts went through his mind, such as: "How can a farmer make a pledge when he doesn't know what his income

will be?" "How can a farmer make weekly payments when his income does not arrive until the end of the season?" "Wouldn't it be easier to write a check that would cover his annual pledge right after he received the money for his



harvest?" "Why should the congregation give so much for World Missions when they have so many needs in their own church?" "Why should a farmer be expected to contribute as much as city folks who had a much larger income?"

These and many other thoughts kept continually going through his mind, but having learned as a Christian that he must talk things over with God, he went home that night to meditate on what he had heard.

He could not go to sleep until he decided to talk the matter over with his wife the next day. After breakfast he started asking his wife some of the questions that had troubled him the night before. Having told his wife about the guest speaker, he asked her, "How can

A wise man named Richard Braunstein once made the following statement:

“It is possible to give without loving, but it is impossible to love without giving.”

Because God’s nature is to love, God constantly reaches out to us with grace we do not merit and love which is without restraint.


In fact, God’s love is so unrestrained that God gave the world the best gift known to humankind. As the Gospel of John puts it: “God so loved the world that he gave his only son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have everlasting life.”(John 3:16)

In short, God’s love inspires us to love and give even as God has given to us. That is how stewardship comes alive within ourselves. As Braunstein said, “It is impossible to love without giving.”

Traveling through old Jerusalem with a tour group, I noticed that a doctor’s wife could not pass by a beggar or handicapped person without showing love to them in one way or another. A small monetary gift, a warm smile, a show of concern came easily, even eagerly, from her loving body and spirit. Seeing her love and caring was a memorable exhibit I can never forget. It truly was impossible for her to love without giving, without practicing stewardship. 

When we trust in the Lord, we receive the name tag “Child of God.” No one is excluded from that. God’s plan is to bring everyone to him. God loves everyone so much, and desires that all accept Jesus Christ to be made fully whole in their lives. But that only happens when all of us are involved.

When you know that you are loved and special, and when you realize you have unique talents to give to God, then you can see that your involvement in winning the world to Christ is crucial. When we begin to do that as a church, as a people, and as a congregation, hell cannot prevail in our lives or anyone else’s.




The Tie That Binds Us

Christian commitment is the tie that binds us to the purpose and power of God. The Apostle Paul describes the commitment of Christ: He “humbled himself” ... “unto death, even death on a cross.” God still did this because of the commitment to enter our world and reveal God’s love and our need of God.

Now you and I are challenged to be of this same “mind” or commitment. Sometimes the tie that binds us to God’s purpose is a sort of slip-knot arrangement, allowing slack for our own desires. Paul urges us to tie our commitment tightly and squarely as Christ.

A real test of our commitment is stewardship. Paul says, “Let each of you look not only to his interests, but also to the interest of others.” When we consider how Christ humbled himself, how the needs are just as desperate today, and how we are called to have the same mind ... even a tithe seems small, doesn’t it? The discipline of tithing is the square-knot by which God blesses the tie that binds us to him and to others. If, as a Christian, you haven’t tried tithing, do it now and ask God to bless you!

we make a pledge when we don't know what our income will be?” To his surprise she answered, “When we bought the new tractor we signed a promissory note to the bank agreeing to pay \$22,000 in three different installments. How could we do that without knowing what our income would be?” He then raised another question: “How can we make weekly pledges when we don't sell our crops until fall?” This time she responded, “We have many other obligations to meet before our crops are harvested and we pay them. Why should we neglect the church? Besides, didn't you say that you agreed with the speaker when he said that our giving really should be a part of our worship of God?”

Out of the discussion came the conclusion that the question of the stewardship of their means had never been a subject of prayer with them. They agreed to pray about this until the end of the week when they would again attend church. On Sunday morning at breakfast he said, “Today we are going to give an offering in the spirit of worship. Let's ask our pastor for a set of offering envelopes, too.” Knutson had learned through prayer and honest soul-searching that the most important thing with stewardship is not the support of a church budget. Real stewardship rather demands a dedication of all that we have to the Lord. Like the Macedonians, we must give ourselves unto the Lord.



I Will Give You Rest

Jesus tells his followers about the great love his Father has for all people. He continues his teachings concerning the burdens in life and asks us to allow him to help.

We don't have to have birthed children to know about labor and burdens. Children, of course, are not the burden; however, the financial and emotional cost of raising them sure can be at times. Labor and burdens are a part of every person's life. I think that is Jesus' point. We need to accept this fact meekly and humbly; figure out which burdens are rightly ours, accept his help, and then get on with carrying them.

Picture all your problems on a rickety cart with a "T" shaped wooden yoke attached. Imagine yourself and Jesus putting the yoke on, and pulling the weight together. Heads bent by the wooden bar, you and Jesus are walking in step. You are focusing on his feet and yours. You are breathing in sync—you breathe in and he breathes out.

I remember my Lamaze training before the birth of our last two sons. Focus and breathing were an important part of that process. During those labors my husband was my coach. We breathed and focused together, and the labor was bearable, far easier than my first three experiences.

I also remember the days I take my problems with me to centering prayer. I say a simple prayer and place them in Jesus' and my rickety cart. I sit still, focusing on Christ's presence, slowly breathing in and out. Those are my good days, when my problems are bearable, and I'm even sometimes able to help shoulder someone else's burdens.
