## FROM OUR BISHOP

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Each year at this time, I write about the ministries funded by the Bishop's Annual Appeal. Your generosity makes it possible for these ministries to provide essential education, pastoral care and other assistance to thousands of people across our 16-county diocese. For this, I say, "Thank you." These ministries couldn't happen without you.

This past year has been challenging. Our Diocese just completed the bankruptcy reorganization process. I hope it will help victims of abuse to move further along the path of healing. For almost a year now, our world has been in the grip of the COVID-19 pandemic. The virus has severely impacted people's health, our economy and even the way we're able to practice our faith.

Jesus went out into the desert. There, he faced temptations and challenges, but angels come to minister to him. At times during the pandemic, we've experienced our own desert, separated from members of our family, parish and community. But angels have been there, too. I'm grateful for the dedicated service of our pastors, parish and diocesan staff, and volunteers who continue to do the work of Christ and meet our spiritual needs in these trying times. In many ways, our need for these ministries is greater than ever.

The Diocesan TV Mass and parish livestream Masses have been a lifeline for the homebound. Other ministries of the Appeal continue their work in support of faith formation, family life, our Catholic schools, multicultural ministries, evangelization and vocation-discernment. These ministries are using new and creative ways to keep us connected when we've been required to stay apart. The diocesan Education Office launched a new resource in English and Spanish to assist families in reflecting on the Sunday Scripture readings. An online men's conference is planned for later this month. We've learned some lessons along the way, like how to use technology better in service to the Church. But, while Zoom, YouTube and Facebook Live are wonderful tools, they don't replace the very real human need for in-person ministry, service and social activities. Livestreaming the Mass helps us stay connected to our faith and one another during a pandemic, but it doesn't replace being present together for the sacrifice of the Mass. I hope this pandemic has fostered in us an even-deeper appreciation for Christ's presence in his Body and Blood, and his presence in the people with whom we worship.

The Liturgy of the Eucharist begins with the preparation of the gifts. These gifts — bread and wine offered by human hands — become the Body and Blood of Christ. We come forward together to receive this new gift--the Eucharist--which brings us closer to Jesus and transforms our hearts, so that, through Him, we can become "bread for the world's bodily and spiritual hungers."

The ministries funded by the Bishop's Annual Appeal make a difference in the lives of so many others. It's your generosity — your hands — that makes this work possible, and it's the reason for this year's appeal theme: "Gifts Offered by Human Hands." I ask you to please prayerfully discern a gift to the Appeal and join others around the diocese in supporting this work. As always, I promise your gift will only be used for Appeal ministries and not for any other purpose. I invite you to reach out to me with your prayer intentions through the Appeal materials you'll be receiving in the mail. And I offer my blessing to you and your loved ones as we approach the holy season of Lent. Please pray for me, and I will continue to pray for you.

# Stewardship

Inspiring a deeper understanding of true giving

February 2021

**O**nce there was a little village nestled securely in a valley between two mountains. Its people were very advanced compared with those who lived in the neighboring villages. They had learned how to build bridges, how to farm the slopes of the mountains, how to make laws to govern themselves, and how to write poetry about the beauty that surrounded them. They were indeed a clever people.

The villagers had a special treasure ... a chest filled with beautiful jewels. No one could remember just how or when the village had first come to possess the chest, except that it had been given to them as a gift from someone who had loved them very much. The villagers were very proud of their treasure. They took good care of it and even built a special room for it.

Life was good for the people who lived in the village, but one thing disturbed them. They longed desperately to share the beauty of the jewels with their children; to let them see the sparkling colors with their own eyes. But they could not. They had forgotten how to open the chest.

This was a very distressing situation, but the people rarely had a chance to address themselves to it. Their bridge-building, farming, law-making, and writing kept them very busy. However, one day they did hold a meeting to discuss the problem. Everyone agreed how very important it was for the children to be able to see the jewels with their own eyes and they drafted a strong resolution to that effect. But when they got around

to discussing how the chest might be opened, no one felt qualified to open it or had the time to try. Each year they passed a resolution about how important it was for their children to see the jewels with their own eyes. And yet each year no one felt qualified to open the chest or had the time to try.

The moral of this story is if you don't take time, it will take you. The trail of broken promises and commitments in our lives is paved with the excuse of not having time.

Stewardship is the experience of turning intentions into actions. Share your time and talents with others ... and don't forget committing some of both to your church. 

*Time is a gift from God, to be used wisely, not frittered away. God allows us to choose how to use this gift. Do you use God's time for loving and caring deeds?*

One who is faithful in the use of their time does not live in fear of the future, but constantly faces the question of whether or not they are making wise use of the years at their disposal. ## Active, Not Passive



**P**eter instructs us to prepare for the coming again of Jesus by being good stewards over all that God has given us.

**A** concert pianist one evening gave a stellar performance, receiving a standing ovation as the curtain fell. Afterwards, a reception was held in his honor. As the crowd gathered around him, one woman, who was a pretty good pianist in her own right, gushed, "Oh, I'd give anything to play as you do!" The concert pianist looked at her and slowly replied, "No, I don't believe you would." A hush fell over the room. "Yes, I would," insisted the woman.

The pianist continued, "No, you really wouldn't. If you wanted to pay the price, you could play as well ... possi-

bly even better than I. It has taken me seven or eight hours a day, seven days a week for at least seven years to play as well as I do. You would give anything to play as well as I do, except the time. When you say you would give anything, you don't really mean it."

Are we really willing to do whatever it takes to help? Or, do we sometimes think, "Enough is enough. No more help. No more for missions. No more time for the church. It has to stop!"

But as Jesus' actions make clear, enough is never enough. Jesus is filled with compassion (as we usually are too), and then he acts on that compas-



# BRINGING HOME THE GOSPEL

February 7, 2021 • 5th Sunday in Ordinary Time • Mark 1:29–39

## Taming Our Demons

*After leaving the synagogue, Jesus enters Peter's house and cures his mother-in-law. The town begins to gather at the door bringing their sick and possessed. Jesus cured many of them. He leaves with his disciples and travels to the nearby villages to preach and cast out demons.*

I believe that most of us have some sort of demon inside us. Something we would really like to change about ourselves, but just can't. I'm not talking about superficial things like the size of our nose or hips. It's an inside thing—some bad habit or personal sin that usually ends up hurting the people closest to us or even ourselves.

It could be something like losing your temper, not thinking before you speak or not speaking when you should. It might even be some sort of addiction. With me it was letting my anger loose in unhealthy ways, usually by yelling at the people I loved most.

When my children were little, my husband traveled. I was lucky enough to be a stay-at-home mom, but I got to stay home with five kids under ten. I loved my children; there is no question that I would have died for them. But whenever I thought of Paul's message in 1 Corinthians 13, "love is patient; love is kind... it is slow to anger..." I cringed. That was not me. I woke every morning and said to myself, "I will get through this day without yelling. I will try harder, work harder; I can change."

The truth was I couldn't change, not by myself that is. It wasn't until I could say, "I cannot do this God, please help me," that I could begin to tame my demon. My morning prayer became, "Lord, fill me with your love and strength so that I can get

through breakfast without yelling." And then, "Get me to lunchtime, Lord."

I finally discovered that the love Paul was talking about in 1 Corinthians was something stronger than even a mother's love; it was God's love. The great thing is that with God's help (and sometimes some professional help) we can all conquer our own worst demons. We just have to ask.

### FAMILY RESPONSE

Discuss what we mean when we talk about good and bad habits. Ask each person to name a bad habit they have, and then have each person tell the others what good habits they see in them.

### PERSONAL RESPONSE

What is your own personal demon? Are you ready to ask God to give you his love and strength to overcome it? What do you want to remember from last week? What are you looking forward to next week? What are your concerns?
