

FROM OUR PASTOR

Dear Members of St. Mary's Parish,

Easter has arrived. Solemn liturgies have been celebrated, Christian initiation has taken place, and our Lenten observances have come to an end. And it may be a natural enough question for a Christian to pose after the Great Feast Day: **Now what?**

It's the same question that confronted the first disciples in Jerusalem, and the scriptures tell us, with various stories, that the answer wasn't clear. In the gospel of John, the apostles decide to leave town and to return to their former life of fishing in Galilee. They apparently concluded that there was nothing more to be seen or done after the Resurrection of Jesus, and so *they went back to life the way it had been before Jesus ever came along in the first place*. At least they *tried* to do that. Jesus wasn't finished with them yet, but they didn't realize it.

The gospel of Luke tells us a different story about leaving town. In his telling of it, some of the disciples hit the road for the village of Emmaus. They too probably figured that, whatever Easter had meant that morning for Jesus, it was over—at least for them. The disciples who stayed back in Jerusalem locked themselves into an upper room. **Now what?** The Lord still had important work for them to do, but they too weren't yet aware of it.

And so, that same question confronts us all: **Now what?** As in the case of the scriptural accounts, the proper answer involves neither sitting around nor running away. Nor does it suggest a return to life as it was before as if the lasting effects of Easter have nothing to do with our own transformation and mission.

Christ's resurrection is intended to change us enduringly and to ready us to take our part in God's mission of Kingdom-building. We too may not be entirely aware yet exactly what that means for us specifically. We rely on the Holy Spirit to show us, as the biblical friends of Jesus did. **This isn't over!**

Please pray for our 11th graders who are being confirmed this Sunday afternoon and Tuesday evening. May the Holy Spirit work in their lives as a leaven for good.

On Wednesday, May 12, I am hosting an information night for my October 4 Pilgrimage to the Holy Land in the Great Hall at 7:00 PM. We will be safe distancing and masked up as is our policy, but we can meet. Inspiring a deeper understanding of true giving

No living creature can match the physical strength and stamina of the common ant. One observer who watched an ant dragging a dead grasshopper, weighed the bodies of both. The ant was pulling 60 times its own weight. To equal such a feat, a 150 pound man would have to drag a load of four and a half tons! What great gifts God has given to all creatures. We can only admire the remarkable powers of the tiny ant!

But human beings were made to do more than haul tons around. God has given you the power to help change the world for the better. You have no idea how much you can do to use your abilities to help mankind. Criticizing or complaining accomplishes little. But as soon as you start “doing” even one little thing for Christ you will begin to realize your tremendous power.

Our abilities should be dedicated to God. The abilities of the successful Christian business person are needed in God’s church. The trained, efficient teacher should be using his or her talent in the church, as well as in the school-room. The person gifted in music should contribute to an effective music program in the church. The doctor and nurse will find many ways of using their abilities for furthering the Christian church.

Young people in choosing their life vocation should ask how this profession can contribute to the work of the kingdom of Christ. What a blessing it would be if people were willing to tithe their abilities as well as their money! The secretary, the carpenter, the plumber, the painter, the teacher, the artist, the musician, as well as others could make vital contributions to the church by using their particular tal-

ent for the work of the church. If one’s work is legitimate, there is some way that that talent can be used for God.

The story is told of a young Christian artist by the name of Joseph Peterson. As he rode the streetcars he noticed the many advertisements in the cars, yet no advertisements for Christ and the church. He decided to use his gift in preparing

Givers Have More Fun than Takers

God has given us the sun to light the world and keep us warm. He has given us darkness so we'll be able to sleep at night. He has given us trees to climb and build forts in and sit under to rest. He has given us water to swim in and drink when we're thirsty and to wash with when we have to.

God has given us parents so we'll have clothes and a home and somebody to help us with our homework. God has given us the whole world. Free. God doesn't ask for much in return. He asks only that we love him.

But how can we show God we love him if we can't even see him? Jesus has given us the answer to that. He said that we show our love for God by doing what he wants us to do. Also, by giving and by doing things for other people.

By giving some of your time to help with the dishes ... or make beds ... or clean the basement without complaining. Or by always paying attention in school and not talking. Or by always being nice to others, even when they aren't nice to you. These are all ways to give to God by giving to others.

Another good way to give to God is by giving to God's church: by giving to the missions and by giving something on Sunday in church when we offer ourselves to God. Don't ask your mother or father for the money. That way they would be doing the giving. You would only be putting the money in the basket for them. The thing to do is give part of your allowance, or give something out of money you earn.

What many people do is give God 10% of what they earn. Ten cents out of every dollar. This would mean that if you get five dollars each week, you would give 50 cents of it to God on Sunday. If you get 10 dollars a week, you would give \$1 of it to God. Giving 10% of what you have is called tithing. If 10% sounds like a lot, stop and think again about all God has given you!

Just think. If everybody would begin giving, then everybody would soon be getting as well as giving and everybody would be happy. That's God's plan. He wants us all to be givers. He wants us all to be happy too.

So God's fixed it so that givers have more fun than takers! 

Throughout his teachings, Jesus simply asked that we change the way we think ... change the way we look at ourselves and our neighbors ... learn to use our life, our talents, our gifts, to serve others ... and through service to others, find that we have served and loved God.

Building Rafts

Some birds build nests right beside the water, sometimes only inches away. If there is a flood, and the lake rises too high, the eggs will be chilled and won't hatch. This problem can be especially devastating in the case of endangered birds, such as loons, leading to dangerously low numbers of chicks being raised each year.

So scientists designed and built special rafts, covered them with cattails and other weeds, and then anchored them loosely in sheltered areas. Often, birds will use them for nesting sites. If the lake floods, these rafts will float, keeping the nests and their eggs safe

from the water. In a way, raft-building is something all stewards do. Of course, they are usually not actual rafts. However, they do help others to stay out of harm's way.

Starting, running, and donating to a food pantry all help keep away the dangers of malnutrition. This is especially important for children, the sick, and the elderly.

Providing school supplies and tutoring helps keep the dangers of ignorance away. In many cases, adults need help with learning just as much as children do.

Building and repairing homes helps keep the dangers of homelessness - crime, cold, lack of sanitation, to name just a few - away from people who

because of illness, disability, or unemployment, are vulnerable to being on the street. Most importantly of all, maintaining a house of worship helps people keep the dangers of sin away from themselves. Comforting prayers, inspirational sermons, and joyous hymns can and do change lives.

The water birds never thank the scientists for the rafts. Stewards may not hear thanks as often as they should, either. But the world is a better, more beautiful place for the birds in it, and likewise for the people who benefit from Christian stewardship.

PEACE BE WITH YOU

The disciples know that Jesus had died and risen, but this knowledge does not keep them from fearing for their lives. They are afraid that what happens to Jesus will happen to them. Jesus comes to them, and greets them offering his peace.

Jesus' disciples are behind locked doors, afraid that at any minute there will be loud knocking and the soldiers will be there to arrest them.

The knock does not come but the Risen Jesus does. And what are Jesus' first words to these disciples he loves? "Peace be with you." Jesus repeats that phrase three times in this Gospel.

Thomas is not present for Jesus' appearance, and when the others tell him about their experience, he doubts their word. Jesus joins the disciples again, and this time Thomas is with them. Once again Jesus greets them with the words, "Peace be with you."

What is this peace that Jesus offers his disciples?

It is not the sort of peace that removes one from danger or trauma. Remember, ten of those apostles received the peace of Christ, and all but one of them died martyrs. And it certainly doesn't magically take away fear or apprehension. The disciples kept the doors locked even after Jesus' first visit.

The peace Jesus gives does not obliterate fear, but it does offer comfort and courage and Christ's strength to get through any sort of danger or trial. When we rest in God's peace we know that no matter what happens, all will be right. Even death has lost its power over us. This is the peace Thomas received after he doubted. It is the peace the disciples received more fully at Pentecost with the coming of the Holy Spirit. It is the same peace we are offered when we cooperate with the Spirit we received in baptism and confirmation. If only we could believe and be truly open to receiving it.

FAMILY RESPONSE

Ask family members to name their number one worry this week. After you have asked God to send the Spirit, sit quietly for about thirty seconds. Tell everyone not to use any words for this prayer, but to just be conscious of every breath they take in and let out.

PERSONAL RESPONSE

What was your experience of the silent prayer like? What do you want to remember from last week? What are you looking forward to next week? What are your concerns?

Distracted driving is when a driver engages in any activity that might distract them from the primary task of driving and increases their risk of crashing.


→ 1 in 7 crashes were distracted driving-related in Minnesota (2015-2019).

→ Distracted driving contributes to an average of 40 deaths and 195 life-changing injuries a year (2015-2019).

With Minnesota's "Hands-Free" law, it's illegal for drivers to read, send texts and emails, and access the web while the vehicle is in motion or a part of traffic. That includes sitting at a stoplight or stop sign.

- The first ticket is more than \$200.
- The second and later tickets are more than \$300.
- Potential for increased insurance rates.
- If you injure or kill someone under the hands-free law, you can face a felony charge of criminal vehicular operation or homicide.
