

## A FAREWELL NOTE FROM FR. STEVE



When a call to ordained priesthood is coupled with an attraction to being with the People of God in a given place, then the call points to diocesan priesthood. Diocesan priests are not only called from the laity; they also live among them so that they can focus their ministry on the mission and spirituality of the laity. I chose diocesan priesthood over religious order priesthood because I wanted to serve the laity and live among the laity rather than in a monastery or religious community.

I have been blest to have lived among God's people in these places: St. Joseph Church in Waite Park, St. Mary's Cathedral in St. Cloud, Cathedral High School, Immaculate Conception Church in St. Anna, Sacred Heart Church in Arban, Our Lady of Mount Carmel Church in Opole, St. Pius X Church in Zimmerman and here, St. Mary's Church in Alexandria. Living among you has been a constant source of blessing, strength and insight as I observe you, participate in your life and learn from you. I find people with whom I live and work to be people of simple goodness. Being able to live "with you" has made me more compassionate toward the very people I have been called to serve, making me a better and more effective diocesan priest. It has, saying it simply, been a privilege.

I notice the simple goodness of people. When in St. Cloud, I went out for breakfast with various groups to local restaurants near the church after morning Mass. Each

group knew what I liked to eat and would have the order waiting for me when I arrived. In St. Anna I would announce, "Your pastor is running low on coffee cake!" and 8-10 frozen coffee cakes would be in my freezer the next day. It was their local Polish specialty and they loved to share the work of their hands. Here I loved walking downtown where people knew me. I loved going into Roers Bakery—the smell of it and with their great breads and knowing the folks

behind the counter...and visiting Rory making lefse in the back. I would eavesdrop when kids were waiting for the bus. I learned what they thought about their parents, or stepparents or teachers and friends and what they liked and disliked. I learned how hard some of the kids struggle to cope with the world in which they live.

I have come to appreciate what parents have to go through all day as they wrestle their brood from one event to another while trying to get to work themselves. I have come to appreciate garbage truck drivers, police men and women, firemen, laborers and professionals who go to work day in and day out, struggling to keep their heads above water.

I treasured being part of your lives at pivotal moments: marriage, the birth and baptism of your children, their first communion and confirmation, as you stand watch as a parent or spouse dies. All these are sacred moments that are part of my life as a diocesan priest. I thank you for letting me be part of your lives.

I chose to be a diocesan priest because I wanted to live with you so as to serve you because you are good people, God's holy people, people who can teach me a thing or two about God as you go about your daily lives. Thank you for that privilege.

As I am being assigned to retirement, I look forward to being more spontaneous. I look forward to having brunch with my family, being a member of my home parish of Sacred Heart in Sauk Rapids, where I will be living in the priest retirement apartments at Speltz House. I look forward to developing other aspects of ministry as well as developing my painting skills, playing the guitar again, maybe forming a musical group, reading more and doing replacement work. Know that you will always be in my heart as you welcome your new pastor, Fr. Matthew Kuhn. Welcome him as you welcomed me. Make him part of your lives too.



## INTRODUCING FR. MATTHEW KUHN

Father Matthew Kuhn, son of Greg and Mary Kuhn of St. Cloud, Minnesota, was born in Alexandria, Minnesota, in 1981. Father Matthew has called many places home due to his father's military career. He attended Saint Olaf College in Northfield, Minnesota for undergraduate

studies in music and education, then entered the Saint Paul Seminary School of Divinity to study philosophy in preparation for priesthood. Bishop John Kinney sent him to Rome for four years to study theology and ordained him a priest for the Diocese of Saint Cloud in June of 2010. Father Matthew then spent two years as a parochial vicar at the Church of Saint Michael in Saint Cloud and the Church of Saint Joseph in Waite Park. 
Father Matt will begin his pastoral service at St. Mary's on June 29. Please join us in welcoming him to Alexandria!

# TECHNOLOGY IN LITURGY

The liturgical act of offering praise and thanksgiving to God requires attentive and engaged eyes, ears, voices, and hearts. When our use of technology in the liturgy aids our attentiveness and active participation, its use is worthwhile.

As we begin the next chapter of integrating the use of technology in our liturgies, a Technology Committee has been created to address the areas of technology

integration, appropriate use of technology during liturgies, and to answer questions. Technology is playing an increasing role in worship and communal prayer. However, it is important to remember that while visual display systems and presentation software can be used to encourage participation, they have to be used carefully with a clear understanding of proper liturgical use.

## Audio Visual Q & A

**Q: WHAT IS COPYRIGHTED IN CATHOLIC LITURGY?**

**A:** Bible translations, Liturgical texts, Hymns, Religious images

**Q: WHY IS COPYRIGHT COMPLIANCE IMPORTANT?**

**A:** It is important because it's the right thing to do. Not only does it uphold the law, which we are called to do as believers whenever possible, but it also honors the people who created those works - Christians who were called and moved by God to invest their time and talent into expressions of art.

**Q: WHY AREN'T THE READINGS BEING PROJECTED DURING MASS?**

**A:** The New American Bible translation is used for the readings at Mass and the USCCB (copyright holder) has not granted permission to project the readings or other Mass texts. The Introduction to the Lectionary (#4) states: "The Word constantly proclaimed in the liturgy is always, then, a living, active word through the power of the Holy Spirit. It expresses the Father's love that never fails in its affectiveness towards us." Again, the role of the assembly is to listen.

**Q: WHAT IF I WANT TO FOLLOW ALONG?**

**A:** Families and individuals are encouraged to bring their own participation aids (hand missals, seasonal or monthly booklets, etc.) to Mass. We are happy to make recommendations for a yearly missal.

**Q: WHY AREN'T MORE IMAGES DISPLAYED DURING LITURGY?**

**A:** The Technology leadership team with the Liturgy Committee has made a concerted effort to not use images as a substitute for liturgical symbols or elements in the church. To achieve this goal, the visual display system will be seen as secondary, rather than a primary focus when we celebrate Mass. The focus must remain on the mysteries that are celebrated, with any visual display system serving to support us in our worship only when required, respecting the unique nature of liturgical celebrations. The goal is to encourage praying, singing, active listening, and sitting in both audio and visual silence. Used without due care and consideration, the overuse of visual display systems can create a ritual behavior over time where the assembly will not respond or participate unless prompted on a screen.



# State of the School Report

## 2020 - 2021

What a school year it has been! I am so proud of our school family for the amazing amount of work, sacrifice, and commitment that was required to keep us learning in-person the entire year. Even though we had to follow many mitigation strategies throughout the year, we did not let those challenges keep us from having a successful school year. School staff were required to be creative in modifying or finding new and unique learning opportunities and experiences. They met those challenges with a positive and can do attitude that inspired our students and parents to do the same!

## 2020-21 SCHOOL HIGHLIGHTS AND ACHIEVEMENTS

**ENROLLMENT TRENDS** This year's enrollment was up 32 students from the previous year and next year's enrollment is projected to be up an additional 20 students! Next year's kindergarten class is full with an additional 8 kindergarten students on our waitlist. The sixth grade class is projected to be at 24, which will be the largest class since the realignment of grade levels at Discovery Middle School.

**SERVICE** During Lent the students participated in the Penny Challenge. All of the proceeds, \$1,785.38, from the challenge were donated to Hospice of Douglas County.

**SAFETY AND SECURITY** Over Christmas break, a vetting system was installed at our main doors. We now have every entry into the school locked throughout the day. All visitors are required to ring the call button and identify themselves before gaining access to the building. This new system added another layer of safety and security for our students and staff.

**ENVIRONMENTAL FIELD TRIP** For over 30 years, students from St. Mary's School have always been provided the opportunity to attend an extended day field trip to Long Lake Conservation Camp. Due to COVID, that camp was closed for the year and we were forced to find another option. We were blessed to find a camp that was faith-based, had an open spot in their schedule and provided similar memorable outdoor learning experiences as Long Lake. In early May the students attended Camp Foley near Pine River, MN. The students enjoyed the climbing wall, canoeing, axe throwing, archery, holding snakes, and geocaching. They also got to experience the responsibilities of keeping their cabin's wood stove going throughout the night to ensure a warm night's sleep!

**SCIENCE TECHNOLOGY, ENGINEERING AND MATH** With the help from a grant from the Catholic Foundation, we were able to enhance our STEM learning opportunities and meet a long-range plan goal by purchasing Sphero learning robot kits. The programmable robot kits inspire creativity and curiosity through coding and play. Our 5th and 6th grade Math Masters teams did an amazing job representing our school this year. Our grade 6 team placed 9th, and our grade 5 team placed 2nd against teams from all over central Minnesota.

## FINANCIAL REVIEW




