Dear brothers and sisters in Christ Iesus.

The first Pillar of the Stewardship Way of Life is Hospitality. We strive to make our parishes places of welcome for all people. We acknowledge that we have to welcome people in before they can be formed in the practice of our faith, before we can pray with them, and before we can call them to works of service, they must first be here! We bring them into our lives of faith so that they may adopt a life of faith in Jesus Christ as well. We want them to have the same relationship with Jesus Christ and His Church that we enjoy.

Hospitality involves caring for the needs of the person; the word "hospital" comes from the same root word. Often our credibility as witnesses to Christ depends on first offering our works of service in care of others. When those receiving our care know that we love them, then this knowledge opens their hearts to receive the message of Jesus Christ. We care for them

because Jesus cares for them, but it is only after giving them this care that they will even ask: "Why are you doing this?"

Saint Teresa of Calcutta. Mother Teresa, famously spent time in Eucharistic Adoration before beginning her service. "I find lesus first in the Eucharist, and then I go and find Him in the poor." When she went out into the streets of Calcutta and found the lost and forsaken of society, they would ask her: "Who sent you?" She would reply; "Jesus sent me to you." Having experienced the love of Jesus in her, they would then ask to meet Jesus. This is the perfect expression of the purpose of hospitality. We are not merely welcoming people into the community of the Church, we are inviting them into relationship with Christ Jesus. We offer them not

merely human community, but full Communion with Jesus, eventually leading them to the Sacraments, and ultimately Full Communion with Jesus.

Hospitality usually begins with providing for the physical needs of our neighbors, but it also demands that we care for their spiritual needs. We care for the whole person. We call them into relationship with Jesus by sharing our own relationship with Jesus. We give witness to how Jesus has made us for love, how Jesus has redeemed us from our sins. how Jesus has changed our lives and given us purpose within the mission of His Church. Most importantly, we call them to heaven by showing how we are living in the joyful expectation of heaven ourselves. If we fail to invite them into prayer, we have not completed our mission. If we only welcome them into our buildings without also inviting them into conversion of heart and freedom from sin, we have not shared with them the whole of our Christian joy. Until we welcome them into our lives of faith, how can we expect them to adopt a life of faith themselves?

ST. MARY'S PARISH LIBRARY

The Parish Library provides adult and young adult materials to educate and inspire parishioners to build God's Church across generations by living the Eucharist, which is the mission of The Church of St. Mary.

The Parish Library began as a section of the St. Mary's School library. During the 2006-07 school year, Jeanne

Nelsen cataloged materials donated by Fr. Victor Kinzer, Fr. Al Ludwig, and Fr. Steve Binsfeld. As titles were added to the school library system, a form was made for parishioners to check out materials.

Few people made use of the Parish Library since the St. Mary's School library was not open during convenient hours for parishioners. At the request of Fr. Steve Binsfeld, a committee was formed to improve access to the Parish Library. Some of the materials were then placed on a movable cart in the Great Hall.

In 2023, the Parish Library was relocated to the Adoration Chapel entrance and is open during chapel hours: 7am–8pm (Monday through Friday)

and 9 am–5 pm on Saturday. The Parish Library has a great collection of DVDs, CDs, and a variety of books on topics central to our Catholic faith. These can be used for personal spiritual enrichment or group Bible studies.

To check out materials, you must be a member of the Come to the Water Area Catholic Community and be age 13 years


