Dear brothers and sisters in Christ Jesus,


We are stewards of the Light of the World, Jesus Christ. We are blessed to be bearers of the Light Himself; such a blessing demands to be shared. Our light must be cultivated, protected, and shared with the world so that we might be as the

Prophet Isaiah foretold: "Nations shall walk by your light, and kings by your shining radiance."

We must cultivate the Light of Christ within our hearts: pruning away the sins that would snuff out Christ's light, feeding the flames with our self-offerings in prayer, works of charity, study of Sacred Scripture and the teachings of Christ's Church. We must constantly work to increase our own faith and keep our relationship with Jesus Christ strong and intimate. We can only share the relationship with Jesus that we have; we cannot give what we do not first have. We must be committed to our mission as baptized Christians and commit our time, talents, and treasures to the mission.

Our light must be protected. In addition to feeding the fire of our devotion to Jesus, we must also protect the flame from the winds that can blow it out. There are too many distractions in this world, too many opportunities to waste our time and energy on fruitless pursuits, too many ways to serve our own self-interest instead of building up the Kingdom of God. We must be focused on our mission as evangelical disciples of Jesus and recommit ourselves to the mission He has made for us.

Our light must shine for others to see. No false humility here; our faith cannot be separated from our



lives in the world. When put to the test publicly, we must have the courage to give witness—to reach out in Jesus' name even when our mission has real world costs. The need is greater than us; there are souls living in darkness that need to see the light of Christ in us. Isaiah instructs us: "Raise your eyes and look about; they all gather

and come to you: your sons come from afar, and your daughters in the arms of their nurses." We are not the only lost children of Israel in this world. Our mission is out there, in the darkness where Christ has yet to be proclaimed by us.

We who have been blessed to receive the gift of faith *must* share that gift with others. Imperfect though we still are, we can share what little we have, and in the sharing, we lose nothing except our pride and self-reliance. When others see the light of Christ shining through our works of charity, through our own struggles toward faith in the midst of brokenness, then they too see a path that they can follow to life in Christ. Perhaps in the gifts that these others bring to the Church we will find that missing element that will fulfill some longing in our hearts; perhaps these new brothers and sisters will themselves be the gift that inspires us all the more. In this will Isaiah's prophecy truly be fulfilled: "Then you shall be radiant at what you see, your heart shall throb and overflow."

May our hearts burn with a desire to share the light of Jesus, and may our lives shine with that light for all to see.





figure I am pretty much the average man; I've been through the typical headaches on the job, the sorrows and the joys of raising five children, paying my bills and generally dealing with the ups and downs life brings. So when I came to consider the question of what stewardship really means, all I had to draw on was my own experiences and those of friends. As I thought about it, here's what went through my mind: First off, the word "stewardship" bothered me. It wasn't exactly part of my daily vocabulary! But then I realized that there are some words which, through generations of use, have come to express a whole set of intertwined truths. I saw that you and I ... all of us ... take care of things either wisely or badly. There are ruined bodies or well-kept homes, dull knives or good friends, polluted streams or secure, well-loved children.

You and I ... all of us ... take care of things either wisely or badly. In the final analysis, we use our time or our abilities or the result of these ... our money ... responsibly or selfishly, thoughtfully or carelessly.

But I've known people who thought, or acted, or said, "I'm a self-made man!" Others showed me, however, that there's no such thing. Where did these priceless gifts of time and ability come from?

A Christian can only answer in humility, "From God."

Showing our gratitude

Further, there can be only one logical reaction for the honest human: Grati-



tude for all God has given us of his free will and love, undeserving as we are.

I wrestled for some time over this and what one's response could be. The General Thanksgiving helped. So did the Sacraments and the Bible. Gradually, it became clearer that we can try to use God's gifts in a way that shows our gratefulness. We can think about how we use our time and abilities and our money.

The New Testament is crammed with examples that Jesus gave about such uses. What else really can we give but the application of these to serve God and our fellow humans? And the church in its mission has shown us many concrete and practical ways of applying our time and talents to these goals.

of this. It was for me, but again, friends showed me that this too can be used wisely or foolishly for God or just for me.

What would be wise here? I have come to believe deeply that a portion of my money, calculated with prayer and great care, should be returned to God for his work. Some of this would be through the church and some through worthwhile community or national charities.

I believe each individual has to determine their own fair share or proper proportion. But he or she can try to be honest with God by setting a goal of a certain percent of their income and then work towards it in steps.

I found that this wasn't easy, but what is that's worthwhile? And God has a way of helping and blessing those who make such a serious and responsible commitment! There are various standards that men and women through the ages have used in this. Jacob said (in Genesis 28:22), "Of all that thou givest me, I will give the tenth to thee." Others think of a Modern Tithe of 5% of one's net income to the church and 5% to charity.

I'm certain of one thing. The exact figures are not the central issue. No, stewardship is returning in love a thoughtful share of our God-given time, ability and money.




