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As a leader, the beauty of the weekend is to see the youth connect with each other, their faith, and with Jesus. Adoration is always a highlight and it is awesome to see the youth deep in prayer and the emotions that surface. It is also a highlight to have the majority of our youth and adults wait in line on the first day of the event to attend Reconciliation – and almost all of them by the end of the weekend.

MID-YEAR FINANCIAL UPDATE

St. Mary's has completed the first half of our fiscal year. Our fiscal year runs from July 1 – June 30. Here are some highlights from the past 6 months:

Our regular sacrificial offerings are our primary source of revenue and support for our parish. After 6 months our offerings are \$627 ahead of our detailed budget. Remember, what you see in the bulletin is a simplified view of the entire year budget spread equally over 52 weeks. For the financials reviewed by the finance council, we break down our budget for each month based on historical trends, etc. While \$627 is positive, it will not help build any cash reserves for unexpected repairs or support any extraordinary efforts.

Your regular sacrificial giving allows our parish community to help those in need, enrich the formation of our faith, take care of our employees with just wages and benefits, and care for our facilities. We have benevolently shared over \$35,000 with local agencies to support individuals; various organizations, such as Life Connections, Garfield Elementary School playground, MN Adult & Teen Challenge, Alexandria Senior Center, TEC, REC; and global efforts like the Holy Land Relief and Lay Mission Helpers. We hosted the Messy Family Project and Men on Fire Retreat. Major facility updates include,

installation of fiber internet for improved reliability, our church roof was re-shingled at a cost of \$161,000 (insurance did NOT cover the storm damage), we installed security cameras throughout campus, and replaced spotlights in the church with new energy efficient bulbs.

We continue to make monthly payments on our **debt**. Our debt balance is down to \$1,018,676.

LOOKING AHEAD...Lots of excitement and momentum as we move into 2024. Mass attendance continues to increase closer to 90% of pre-pandemic numbers. We have begun planning to implement Pathways Family Formation for this fall, ValLimar is returning in March, and we are looking to hire a Director of Faith Formation: we have been without one for the past 10+ years. As the largest parish in the diocese, this has been an unmet need for too long. In July, we will be sending a bus load to Indianapolis for the 1st National Eucharistic Congress in 80+ years!

Facility Priorities – We continue to work for a new parish house, in Alexandria, for both of our priests. The finance council is working to finalize a recommendation. After some creative thinking, we are approaching the school kitchen remodel/expansion with a more simplified, practical concept. While our church roof is in great shape with

some high-quality shingles, our church windows are not. You may have noticed some buckets catching a little water after the December rains. We have been battling the windows since they were installed, in part because some of the windows were an incorrect design by the architect. We have a team together reviewing notes to determine a game plan.

At St. Mary's we believe that, as followers of Jesus Christ, we must also then be Christian stewards. This is not optional. All we are and all we have is a gift from God that He has entrusted to us. May you discern how God wants you to use your gifts in this new year of 2024. We look forward to an exciting year as we parishioners continue to increase engagement and the vibrancy of OUR parish community.

I am grateful for all of you and am blessed to be a part of this parish community. May God continue to abundantly bless you and your family!
